



At present, the CJVC requires structural improvements so that our important programs and services continue safely and without interruption. **The total estimate to complete structural improvements is \$350,000**.

Clarence's prayer was that one day the Vision Center would be complete so that the needs of the precious young people coming through our doors would be met full circle. What he did at the Vision Center for the young people was not work to him, it was a heart felt mission and ministry. Jan Jordan retold one story candidly that expressed the heart behind our mission, "One time a young lady shared an emotional story about her experience with homelessness. Clarence was so moved that he got up and shared with the entire group about his personal journey out of

homeless. I remember how he told the young lady, "I know how you feel; I know what you are going through. See I was homeless once too, but God was always with me". It is with that same heart that the Founder, Pastor John Carter, and all staff members' have prioritized the completion of the building named after him. As owner and operator of this 48,000

sq. ft building located in the 'Gateway Corridor' of the southside of Syracuse, MercyWorks has been providing visionbased programming through the vehicles of technology, entrepreneurism, summer paid internships and

personal development workshops since 2005. The completion of this building will expand service growth within our students by creating a beacon of imagination and innovation for our community.

We affirm Clarence Jordan's life's work and commitment to this work and stand in solidarity with the city of Syracuse as STEAM education is prioritized by carrying on his legacy by naming the building "The Clarence Jordan Vision Center".

To that end, we aspire to inspire vision, create opportunity, and cultivate purpose to transform the lives of young people by providing 11 different programs that serve over 400 students yearly.


of underserved youth and families. For the CJVC, it means promoting the quality of life in a community through both political and nonpolitical processes, and through social capital accomplished by addressing the needs of our blighted building. A growing body of research has found educational facilities and impact on both teacher and student outcomes. With respect to teachers, school facilities affect teacher recruitment. retention, commitment, and effort. With respect to students, school facilities affect health, behavior. engagement, learning, and growth in achievement.

When we think about the quality of education our children are getting, we think about teachers, curriculum material, methods of assessment, and other academic factors. We hardly give thought to the aesthetic of the facade or the cleanliness of the premises that your child spends most of the day in. Our facility can be thought of as an office for adults. Did you know that over 25,000 sq. ft. of our building has not yet been completed? Educational researchers conclude that without adequate facilities and resources, it is extremely difficult for staff and teachers to serve large numbers of children with complex needs.

Vision- based learning gives our students a hope for the future. In the second quarter of 2022 we have received reports that conclude elementary students attending programming at the CJVC average an increase of grade point increases by 10.53 points in reading skills, and 85% of our students state an increase in knowledge in the following areas: entrepreneurship, Microsoft suites, as well as web & application development. The completion of the facility will allow us to expand our footprint in

economic development locally for the older youth by working to make a difference in the civic life of our communities and developing the combination of knowledge, skills, values, and motivation to make that difference.

Friends, while The Clarence Jordan Vision Center provides innovative solutions to alleviate the unmet social and educational needs of underserved youth and families. Let us never forget that we are dealing with human beings; each one unique and with a special story to share that helped others grow and learn. The completion of this project will allow us to finally address multi-faceted technology and programming issues:

Interior Improvements (Rehabilitation and Expansion)

The current structure that facilitates eleven programs has damage inside the facility prohibiting growth of programs or use of space for both programming and income generating purposes. The current structure that facilitates eleven programs has damage inside the facility due to foundational issues, plumbing, and wear and tear. This proposal seeks to address structural deficiencies including the crack in the foundation on the right side of our current facilities. This crack is caused by our building being located on sludge ground. Overtime this has caused plumbing issues. In order to address the plumbing issues tear down of the adjacent building is mandatory.

Technology Upgrade

The pandemic has exacerbated a longstanding digital divide that disproportionately affects lowincome households and black, Indigenous, and people of color communities. Pew reports only 57% of households earning below \$30,000 annually have broadband at home. The digital divide is a



problem of availability, affordability, and digital literacy. As new needs arose the digital divide presented two main characteristics defining the gap for our students: access to high-speed internet and access to reliable devices. Many of our students who struggled from this digital divide faced both during programming in our facility. Our students came to our facility for reliable internet connection, and access to Digital spaces for our youth. Our youth reported the digital space is predominantly out of reach for them because they can't afford costly tools like lab -tops and software. Our students come to our facilities relying on our public computers or tools in the digital worlds.Programs created in collaboration with Syracuse University like web application, digital music labs, coding, etc illustrate the CJVC's commitment to move forward in efforts to close the digital divide. This partnership yielded an increase in students participation and an additional 4 programs to the curricula.

Blighted Building Demolition

Our facility is located on sludge ground, and all of the wear and tear over the years has caused foundation issues that have damaged our bathroom facilities prohibiting growth of programs. The crack in the foundation also prohibits program expansion as well as use of space for both programming and income generating purposes.

Exterior Improvements

The exterior facade will be transformed by reopening blocked in adding pedestrian scale elements engaging people at street level. The parking master plan is based on providing adequate parking located on the side and back of our existing building. The size increase is based on the programming expansion which equates to expanding staff, volunteers, and students. Parking spaces will need to be available in order to suit the needs of the increased students, staff, and volunteers. As parking demands

increase, our lot capacity needs to expand. With the removal of the adjacent structure the parking will be expanded to accommodate visitors, students, and staff. There is a tree growing in our parking lot that can be removed. Once removed that space will be regraveled, paved, and re- striped.

Addressing the issues of our blighted building will expand our workforce development and local internship and hiring program as we continue to partner with our local community partners. Our community partnerships afford us the opportunity to collaborate with local business leaders to bring in hands on training and workshops on important topics that help to mold our participants into balanced, contributing, successful citizens. Regardless of race, socioeconomic background or any other challenges they may face: we are dealing with human beings. Each one unique and with a special story to share. Each one carries a solution this world needs.You can

help provide children with a strong education foundation and empower them to change a generation by supporting our efforts to address our blighted building.


