Synergy Leadership Internship Provides Opportunities to Future Professionals

Strong community partnerships and participation created an environment for our Synergy Leadership Training interns to thrive despite COVID-19. Many of our students worked remotely over the summer. Forty students coming from 14 different colleges covering

31 fields of study were placed with 21 worksite partners!

While most of our students are local, this summer brought students from countries including Kenya, Thailand, Nepal, Iraq, Tanzania, Congo, China, India, Yemen, Ghana, and Somalia! These are young professionals who call Syracuse, NY home. We are grateful to partners, including CNY Works, On Point for College, Say Yes, and Upward Bound, who expand our reach by connecting their students to our programs. We rely on strong worksite partners who understand our mission and vision and support Synergy by welcoming our students and providing enriching internship experiences!

The Community Service component took a new direction this summer for our undergraduate college students participating in Synergy. During the summer months, when Syracuse City School District families and students had little or no access to food, Mercy Works, REACH International, and the SCSD partnered to provide groceries to families living in food-insecure areas.



Synergy students not only helped to serve groceries but learned first-hand about the preparation and planning that takes place to execute community outreaches as large as these! Students learned how to set-up pop-up markets, handle intake, and registration and the logistics behind organized food distributions. Students were able to participate in six large distributions throughout Syracuse. Many enjoyed meeting each other for the first time. The collective effort and interaction with the community resulted in a transform-ational experience for all!



We closed out the Synergy internship with a drive-thru graduation that brought together many of our mentors, workplace partners, supervisors, and workshop facilitators to commemorate the hard work the students put forth amidst a pandemic. Students openly shared about their experiences, confirming for all stakeholders that our joint effort is positively affecting their trajectory, their vision, and the future of Syracuse!


Digital Music Lab

In partnership with the Syracuse University Music Department, we will be offering an exciting twotrack program that will provide a rich music learning experience for high school students. This lab will give an inquiry-based music education built around digital music technology and audio production allowing the Clarence Jordan Vision Center to enter into STEAM education.

At the end of each semester, students present a finished product during a summative event hosted at the Vision Center that includes their finished tracks and a brief abstract about the meanings that underlie their compositions.
